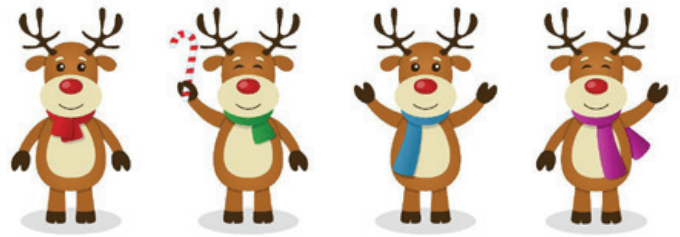

HOPPIN' JOHN

Those who have seen my recipes before will know that I am fond of the cuisine of the Deep South. This recipe, from Louisiana, is a favourite, and if eaten on New Year's Day is supposed to bring good luck for the year. No-one knows where the strange name comes from. Most supermarkets sell Cajun seasoning and you can get black-eyed beans from good delicatessens (they are sometimes called black-eyed peas). - Martin Jones

Ingredients - Serves 2

3 oz bacon; lardons, or rashers cut into small pieces	1/4 lb dried black-eyed beans
1 tbsp oil	1 bay leaf
1 celery stalk, diced	1 tsp dried mixed herbs
1 small onion, diced	1 level tsp Cajun seasoning
1/2 green pepper, diced	Salt
1 garlic clove, chopped	Long-grain rice
	Chopped parsley (optional)

Method

1. Soak the beans for 18 -24 hours in plenty of cold water.
2. Heat the oil in a medium saucepan. Cook bacon slowly till crispy. Add celery, onion, and green pepper and sauté for about 4 – 5 minutes. Add garlic and cook another minute. Drain the beans, and add to the pan, together with the bay leaf, herbs, Cajun seasoning and sufficient water just to cover.
3. Put a lid on the saucepan and simmer very slowly for about 1½ hours till the beans are tender but not mushy. Check the water from time to time and top up if necessary.
4. Shortly before the beans are done cook the rice in accordance with the instructions on the packet. Add salt to taste to the bean mixture and serve over the rice. Garnish with parsley (optional).

Serve with kale or spring greens.

AMERICAN WIFE, BY CURTIS SITTFELD

The November choice for the book club was American Wife by Curtis Sittenfeld. A small group of us met to share our ideas about the novel and an interesting discussion took place.

Initially it is important to point out that in interviews the author stresses that this is not a biography, but she was inspired by Laura Bush, wife of the President of America George W Bush. She suggests that 85% of the book is made up and that she is ultimately exploring the cost of fame focussed on the heroine, Alice. However, she includes several life changing incidents from Laura Bush's own life that can be clearly identified, and these provide the basis of the book in which the heroine eventually faces consequences and contradictions that are years in the making.

The book starts in the 1940s and tells the story of Alice Lingren who grew up in a small, quiet town in Wisconsin with parents and a sympathetic grandmother – a significant figure in her life. She obviously has no idea that she will eventually marry the President of America and live in the White House. The first significant incident happens when Alice is in her teens and there is a tragic road accident in which a friend dies, and that seems to change her identity and the trajectory of her life. We know a similar accident also happened to Laura Bush at a similar age. A decade later Alice is swept off her feet by a man and into a world of American Republicanism and privilege. When that man then first becomes governor and then the president, she realises that she is in love with him but fundamentally disagrees with his beliefs and that her own beliefs run against her public persona. She then must face issues that are, apparently, impossible to answer.

Several points were raised in our discussion:

We generally agreed that the book was readable and although perhaps too long and included detail that did not necessarily add to the narrative the first-person narrative was in places compelling.

We considered the ethics of an author fictionalizing a living person, mingling non-fiction and fiction and leaving readers asking the question 'how much of this is true?' Did the author need to use a real person as her main protagonist - would the novel have been as effective/popular with an unknown main character?

We also considered that although the author included relatively recent events (George W Bush was president over two terms 2001-2009) could this still be considered an historical novel? The discussion then briefly discussed the role that historical novels play in exploring and shaping our understanding of history.

The book received generally high critical praise, particularly in US. However, this was not unanimous, and one critic used the words gossipy and salacious suggesting that this did not give the work an honest quality and in places became it became almost voyeuristic. There was a general agreement in the group that this was so.

In conclusion there appeared to be a consensus that, although the book was readable, it was not one that could be whole heartedly recommended.

WHEN THE RED-RED ROBIN COMES BOB-BOB-BOBBIN' ALONG...

...you know it must be nearly Christmas! In an annual competition this lovely little bird, with its orange-red breast, is consistently voted the most popular bird in the country.

I was reminded about Christmas and robins as I watched one of the three pairs of robins in our garden. Yes, they are territorial, but they have carved it up between them and respect each other's space. The one that lives closest to the house has started helping itself to the fish food which gets caught on the edge of the fishpond! I watched this amazing activity while peeling vegetables at the kitchen sink, a task it made much more interesting than usual.

For centuries, this tiny bird has been the symbol of good luck, happiness, and sometimes even as a messenger for lost, loved ones. There are tales stretching back to Norse mythology where the robin is the protector from storms and lightning.

But historically, the robin has a good story to tell, especially when Christmas comes around. I mean - why does it have a super orange-red breast? There are several suggestions, mostly tied up with Christianity but certainly not biblical!

Myth has it that after Jesus was born in a stable in Bethlehem a fire was lit in order to keep the Holy Family and new baby warm. The local robin was concerned that the heat might be too much for the infant so bravely spread his wings to protect him. The fire scorched the robin's breast an orange-red colour and all robins have been that way ever since. A variation similarly claims the robin fluttered his wings to keep the baby cool from the heat and, in the same way, his breast was scorched.

(Interesting fact: the robin's breast was originally referred to as red because the colour orange did not exist. And the redness of the robin *is* orangey (is that a word?). The word 'orange' was first used as a colour in English in 1512, named after the fruit which had become popular in Europe).

The reputation of the robin was enhanced even more in Victorian times when the Post Office came into being. The men who delivered the letters (in what was an amazing revolution at the time) were affectionately known as 'robins.' Their uniform included a bright red jacket. As the sending of cards at Christmas spread, the robin spread likewise from the garden to featuring on the cards. What is not to like about a pretty red breasted robin sitting on a holly tree in a snowy background?

Many of us will choose such a card this year, despite the dwindling numbers sent these days. If you receive cards why not check how many robins you can spot? Oh – and do not forget to feed them if the weather gets tough, too!

CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT

EAST TO WEST AND WEST TO EAST

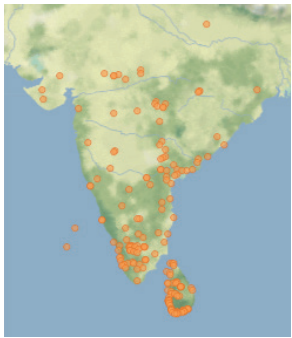
If you're reading this, it is December! If it's December it must be nearly Christmas, literally 'The Mass of Christ.'

You are not supposed to know what you're being given for Christmas but this year I had a sneak preview! Although I've got far too many books already at my bedside, I am really looking forward to reading William Dalrymple's book about the wisdom of ancient India, particularly as I've already heard him talking about it.

The Tibetan plateau is huge and bare; it warms and cools spectacularly during the year sparking trade winds around the vast Indian subcontinent and its seas. Choose the right time and it is easy to travel and trade to both west and east.

Perhaps it is coincidence, but our ancestral religion was literally born in the midst of the Roman Empire. Christianity inevitably became a global force when adopted by the Emperor Constantine, who founded the long-lasting eastern Roman Empire based on the city we today call Istanbul but, in antiquity, was known as Constantinople.

It was inevitable that 'Rome' (the western empire based in Rome) was massively influenced by ancient cultures around the Mediterranean basin, but I'm pretty sure that William is going to make a compelling case for India likewise.



This map shows density of Roman coin hoards found in the Indian subcontinent in orange (on the original map), Kerala and Sri Lanka standing out. The Romans were clearly extremely interested in India - but why, what are we missing? The Roman writer Pliny (who could be dyspeptic at the best of times) belly-ached about the massive trade imbalance:

Rome was being stripped of gold by purchases of Indian luxury goods. Perhaps their Roman world, like ours, was suffering from an accelerating acquisitive spiral.

It seems likely that ancient India gave us a colossal amount of knowledge and culture in maths (including our modern numerology), geometry and philosophy. But this is Christmas time, so the significance of that story and some speculation are in order.

Where commerce flourishes ideas are blown along the trade winds. India was a crucible of thought, so concepts, like fine goods, would have made their way into the Red Sea and after a short land crossing into the Mediterranean.

Here I feel a little nervous. I know next to nothing of comparative theology, but I wonder if there is going to be a Christmas-related notion in the offing! In Christian thought God said to be a Trinity: Father... the ultimate consciousness, Son... the word, and Spirit... wind or breath. This concept is perplexing to many: can't they make up their minds? Is it one or is it three? However, such an idea would be, more than likely, no surprise at all in Ancient India where Buddhism and Hinduism both greatly pre-date Christianity. They also have notions of three aspects of one God. For instance, in Hinduism, the ultimate being is personified by Brahma, consciousness by Siva and bliss by Vishnu. These gods have other properties that complicate matters to western minds, but is this so far from Christian theology? Many have pointed out the similarities between Buddhism and Christianity, even going as far as speculating that Christ's 'missing years' may have been spent on the subcontinent. Many, though, may think there is a more everyday, understandable explanation for the similarities. It turns out that so many other world religions show a trinity principle: was three, then, the perfect number?

The Christian narrative is well-known, God's Son, from the moment of conception receiving the Spirit, or, as some insist, at his baptism. Do these far more ancient resonances diminish the narratives we yearly tell? I would argue not: au contraire, if anything, they make it more interesting and deeper set in humanity.

At any rate the cult of Jesus and Christian God was, you might think, a ready-made trinity, ready to move up smoothly through the gears of world religion.

I hope, like me, you adore Christmas: the music, the stories, the lore (especially our island traditions), the anticipation of Advent and all that. Even the glitz can be exciting once we have a sense of why we are making this age-old yearly remembrance.

Happy ChristMas and (as Tiny Tim observed): 'God bless us all, everyone.'

DIDDLEBURY & WESTHOPE WI

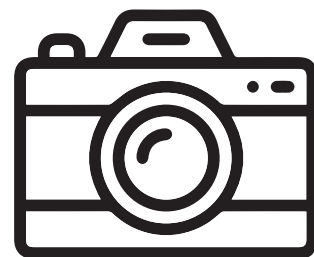
Our November meeting was held at Culmington Village Hall and embraced the fast-approaching Christmas season.

NEWS FROM SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL

The budget has not generally been very well received in the rural areas. There is great concern at the decision to levy inheritance tax on family farms. Our farms are important drivers of our local economies and this is a harsh decision, especially in the wake of one of the worst harvests in recent memory.

I spent eight years as Chair of the Rural Services Network (RSN), a national group representing rural service providers and rural local authorities. We consistently tried to impress on government the need for fair funding allocations for rural local authorities. RSN is supporting rural authorities and businesses by writing to the Minister for Housing, Communities and Local Government, Jim McMahon. RSN points out that in the 2024-25 Local Government Finance Settlement, urban councils received 36% per head more in Government funded spending than rural councils. Over the years rural councils have had to rely on increased council tax to help balance the books, resulting in rural council tax being on average 20% per head higher than urban. Rural workers' wages are lower than the national average and their cost of living higher. This needs to be corrected and rural economies supported at a time when costs are rising inexorably.

Shropshire's Planning team had a nasty shock when, completely out of the blue, they received a letter from the Planning Inspectorate regarding our Local Plan. As you may know this had been progressing painstakingly through its different stages and had started on the examination in public. Abruptly they were told that the Inspectors would not be proceeding with the hearings proposed for November and December. They have had no explanation for this yet, but are aware that other local authorities have received similar instructions and, like us, their annual quota of houses to be built has been

doubled by the government. We await more information from the Planning Inspectorate which, to date, has not been forthcoming.

I reported previously on the potential merger of local authorities into combined authorities under a Mayoral system. We understand a White Paper will be released in late November which hopefully will clarify the Government's intentions on Combined Authorities. We hear it may include the demise of District Councils, bringing dramatic change for those authorities with a County and District local government structure, often common in rural authority areas. We presume combined County and District Councils will become unitary, and existing unitaries may be grouped into ever larger combined authorities, potentially including Police & Crime Commissioners and Integrated Healthcare Systems. We await enlightenment!

On a brighter note I'm delighted to report that two members of Shropshire Council's social work teams have won prestigious awards at the National Social Worker of the Year Awards. Chloe Lambert and Sue Bunker both won Gold Medals, Chloe in the Adult Social Care Worker of the Year category and Sue in the Team Leader of the Year category. This is fantastic recognition for our social work teams who work so hard: their awards are richly deserved.

Finally, Christmas is fast approaching; may I wish you all a very happy and enjoyable festive season and a happy and healthy New Year.

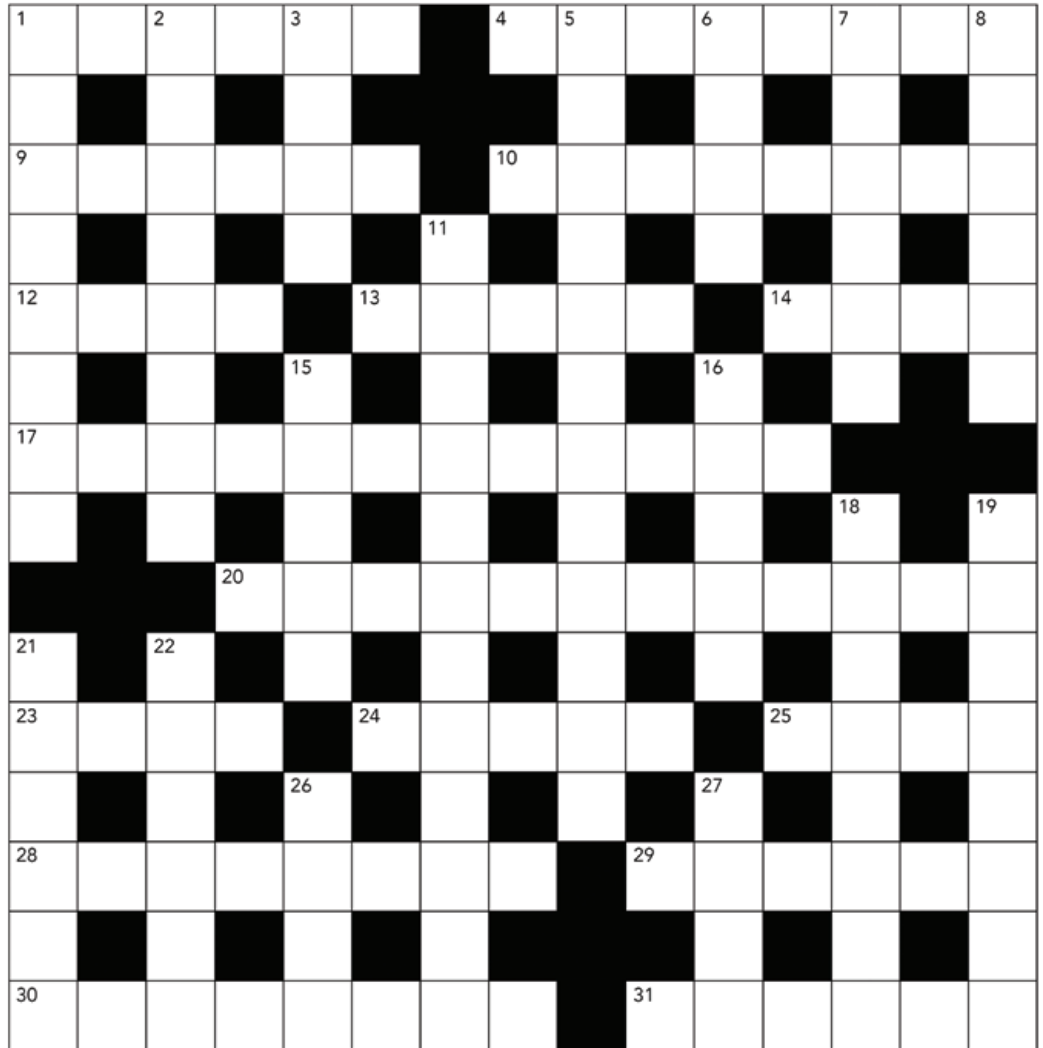

CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ORDINARY MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 5TH NOVEMBER

Present: Councillors Mr A Pike (Chair), Mr Ian Alderson, Mrs C Byng, Mrs M Holland, Mrs J Mear. In Attendance: Cllr C Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Mr M Seabrook, Mr I Steele, Mr J Turley and Ms J Watts.

Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting: None.

Public Involvement Session: One member of the public was in attendance but made no comment.

Minutes of the meeting held on 1st October were approved as an accurate record and were signed by the Chair.

Reports: Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley reported that the candidate selected by the Conservative Party for the Corvedale Division of Shropshire Council was Dr Colin Stanford. It was not clear which other parties would stand in the Corvedale at next May's election. Shropshire Council had now moved out of Shirehall and would eventually move into the Guildhall. Inspectors had suspended hearings into SC's Local Plan but had not yet informed the Council of the reason for the suspension.

Village Hall Committee: Cllr Mear said that the Tractor Run had been successful and had been supported by residents and the police. There would be a joint Race Night at Westhope Village Hall. The committee continued to work on raising funds for the extension.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Byng reported that there had not been a FAG meeting since the last Parish Council meeting.

Emergency Officer: Mr Disley went through the draft plan. He stressed the importance of community involvement in the plan and would ensure that it was compliant with General Data Protection Regulations. There would be a team of coordinators to ensure that if one person were not available others could carry out the plan in an emergency. It would eventually be publicised on notice boards, website and in Ripples. A log of activity during an emergency would be kept, to keep everyone safe and to assist with learning after the event. Mr Disley would bring the final version of the plan and costs for equipment etc to the January Parish Council meeting for inclusion in the budget for 2025-26. The Emergency Plan would be placed on the agenda annually in November. The council was supportive of the plan and the Chair thanked Mr Disley.

South Shropshire Area Committee: H Coonick (Clerk) reported that she had not attended the meeting on 19th September due to other commitments. The minutes recorded a presentation by the new MP Stuart Anderson – he now had his constituency office in Ludlow and Bridgnorth and had stepped back from the Opposition Front Bench in order to devote his time to constituency matters. He encouraged parishes to raise concerns with him. He believed the current formula for funding local government disadvantaged rural areas and did not feel that funding was being allocated across Shropshire equitably. He wanted to see better service provision in rural areas with a shift towards local medical centres/community hospitals. He also thought there was a resource management issue

in terms of the distribution of policing across the area.

Flooding: There would be a landowner engagement event at 6.45pm on 19th November which was aimed at identifying and engaging with landowners who might be interested in NFM features on their land as part of Phase 2 of the 'Slow the Flow' project.

Seifton Lane had experienced severe flooding again recently when the water was 3ft deep and only passable in a tractor. Cllr Mear asked for a joint meeting with the Flood Action Group to look at what action could be taken to alleviate the problem.

Planning: 24/03834/TCA Home James, 6 Culmington, SY8 2DB. Fell 1no Silver Birch, crown reduce by 30% 1no Beech & reduce in height by 10ft 1no Leylandii hedge within Culmington Conservation Area. Applicant: Mr Mark Littlejohns. The Council resolved to make no comment.

24/03914/FUL Nos. 1-6 Corve View, Culmington, SY8 2DD Removal of chimneys, extension of roof planes and installation of external wall insulation. Applicant: Connexus Housing Ltd. The Council supported this application.

Complaint to Shropshire Council re Cuts to Services and Expenditure on a Sports Village and Swimming Pool at Sundorne:

Cllr Motley explained that the budget used for infrastructure such as the Sports Village came from a different source from the revenue budget The Capital Budget allowed the council to apply for loans and grants to fund infrastructure.

Policing Priorities: The Council considered that the priorities for the Neighbourhood Team should be a. thefts (farm) b. speeding c. wildlife crime (which includes sheep worrying).

Land Registry Entry for the Village Hall: The Land Registry will complete this application by 5th February 2026.

Correspondence: The Clerk would refer the Tree & Urban Forest apprentice at Shropshire Council to Caring for Gods Acre and the National Landscapes Team.

Website Domain and Emails: It was agreed to transfer to a .gov.uk domain as it would be a free addition to the website service provided by Hugo Fox. A grant would be applied for if appropriate. The .gov.uk email service was not mandatory at present and would not be taken up due to the cost. All councillors would be encouraged to have designated email for council emails.

Finance: The Reserves Policy was adopted. The draft budget for 2025-2026 was considered and would be adopted at the January 2025 meeting when the precept would be set.

Payments were authorised to: D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) £139.50 H Coonick (Clerk), salary Oct-Dec including pay award and HMRC £959.15 and £8.55 travel expenses.

Mrs Jayne Disley was appointed as the Internal Auditor for 2025-26.

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 23RD OCTOBER 2024 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllrs. D Hedgley – Chairman, R Povall, A Watson, C Martyn, S Povall, T O'Boyle.

Apologies: Cllrs A Rattu, R Morgan and T Pardoe.

In attendance: The Clerk, Shropshire Cllr C Motley and five members of the public.

Declarations of Interest: None were made.

Public involvement session: No matters were raised.

The Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 25th September 2024 were approved.

Matters Arising from the Minutes of the last meeting: No information had yet been received from Shropshire Council on how to book a slot to visit Craven Arms Recycling Centre: the new system would come into force on 4th November. No information was available from Cllr Motley about planning applications not being called in by the Planning Committee. Cllr Morgan would be laying the stones in the new playground during half term.

Reports: The Chairman had been abroad for most of the month. The Hereford Diocese was being difficult about the proposed WWI information board in the churchyard.

Cllr Motley reported on the continuing financial difficulties at SC and said 19 local authorities were on the verge of bankruptcy.

Westhope Village Hall: Mrs Worthington reported on a successful Harvest Supper and a forthcoming concert on 23rd November with

the Newtown Male Voice Choir.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn had been abroad for most of October so missed the floods on 16th October. He was assembling information for the next FAG meeting, which he hoped would be well attended.

Diddlebury Village Hall: Cllr S Povall reported that the white lines in the DVH car park might need to be changed as some local residents were complaining about cars using their drives as turning circles.

Louisa Powell Almshouse Charity: Cllr O'Boyle reported on a recent meeting of the administrators. Repairs and maintenance were well in hand. Pet ownership was an issue and pets would only be admitted in special circumstances such as if the house had a garden.

Planning Applications: 24/03616/FUL: Application for the erection of a first-floor extension at The Green Farm, Middlehope, SY7 9JT plus **24/03617/LBC** - application for Listed Building Consent for the above application. Councillors supported this application.

24/03399/FUL: Application for the erection of a temporary marquee for longer than 28 days at the Delbury Hall wedding venue, Delbury Hall, Diddlebury. Councillors supported this application.

24/03830/TCA: Application to fell and replace one beech tree within the Diddlebury Conservation Area, at Delbury Hall, Diddlebury. Councillors supported this application.

Highways/Environmental Issues: Cllr Martyn had visited the site of the flooding on the B4368. A lot of water and mud had been swept onto the B4368 from a field adjoining Pinstones Lane, and due to the camber of the road it collected as flood water on the bridge. Highways had swept the mud up but in so doing had blocked all the drains with mud. They had created a channel to get water off the bridge but Cllr Martyn felt it wasn't large enough to be of use. Ways of stopping the water and mud running off the field and onto the B4368 were discussed but Cllr S Povall said that if 57mm of rain

fell in a short time (as happened on 16th October), flooding was inevitable. Ways of alleviating the flooding were discussed and a supply of sandbags would be further discussed at the November meeting.

Communications and Correspondence: Seventeen items were considered and noted. Connexus had responded advising they are planning 1 x 3 bedroom house and 2 x 2 bedroom houses in place of the existing empty Mill Lane properties. Plans were awaited. A complaint had been received about commercial activity at a house in The Moors which was being investigated. The Chairman would make arrangements to meet the new Community Police Officer, PC Henry King-Salter

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for October 2024 was considered and cheques totalling £474.67 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds totalling £15,894.65, of which £928.46 were third party funds. Cllr O'Boyle verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC's bank statements.

Start time for meetings: Cllr R Povall proposed that DPC start times should revert to 7.30pm and this was agreed, with effect from 27th November 2024

Any Other Business: It was noted that a large park home was situated at Pye Lodge in Lower Corfton and looked like a separate dwelling. It had only been granted temporary planning permission in 2018. It was agreed to investigate the planning position of this caravan.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday 27th November 2024, 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall. There will be no meeting in December.

MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES THE MEETING OF MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON WEDNESDAY 6TH NOVEMBER 2024

Present: Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Richard Arnold, Nigel Dobson, Val Fotheringham, Chris Meeson, Ed Povey and Graham Williams. In Attendance: H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies were received from Cllrs Richard Wilks and Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council).

Declarations of Interest: None.

Public Forum: No members of the public were present.

Minutes of the meeting held on 2nd October 2024 were approved and the Chair signed them.

Reports: Chair: Cllr Archer that she had now used the new booking system for the Recycling Centre at Craven Arms and it had worked well.

Shropshire Council: Cllr Motley was not present but had sent a report. Dr Colin Stanford had been selected as the Conservative candidate for the Corvedale Division for Shropshire Council. It was not clear which other parties would stand in the Corvedale at next May's election. Shropshire Council had now moved out of Shirehall but would eventually move into the Guildhall. Inspectors had suspended hearings into SC's Local Plan but had not yet informed the Council of the reason for the suspension.

Munslow Village Hall: Cllr Dobson reported that the coffee mornings were beginning again and any money raised would go to the Air Ambulance. Those who use the hall needed to remember to turn the heating off after their event.

Highways: The Council had responded to SC's report of September 2023 and the joint meeting between Munslow and Diddlebury Parish Councils and SC. There had been no further action so the Clerk would write to SC asking for action on the recommendations in the Highways Report.

Cllrs Povey, Dobson and Fotheringham presented the proposed Place Plan Entry for traffic calming, which was discussed by the council. It was agreed to recommend the following for the Place Plan:

- To adopt Shropshire Council's recommendations for a consistent approach to speed limits along the B4368 from Craven Arms to Morville, including the provision of 40mph buffer zones either side of existing 30mph speed limit areas, and associated infrastructure.
- To introduce and enforce a 40mph speed limit through the length of the Munslow Parish Council area on the B4368, whilst maintaining existing 30mph zones within it.
- To introduce a consistent entry treatment at each settlement along the B4368 to define village boundaries at start/end of specific speed limits.
- To introduce physical infrastructure at the southern entry to the village of Munslow to reduce entry/exit speeds and to evidence illegal overtaking manoeuvres at this location.
- To introduce speed restrictions in and around the Beambridge crossroads due to restricted sightlines and the slow movement of large commercial and agricultural vehicles at this location.
- To ensure a regular programme of maintenance of existing road signs and posts throughout the Parish, particularly on B4368.
- To extend the 40mph speed restriction north of Broadstone to north of Seven Stars pub to reduce risk of collision for vehicles entering/exiting pub car park and access lane.
- To improve visibility of signage on the approaches to villages through regular hedge cutting and verge trimming.
- To alter the perceived character of the B4368 at the northern end of Aston Munslow (between garage and start/end of 30mph restriction) to reduce the number of vehicles increasing speed as they leave the village northbound.
- To resurface or repair potholes at the community car park in

Aston Munslow.

Members of the public had commented on the sites of the vehicle activated signs (VAS). There were only four posts along the B4368 that had been authorised for use for a VAS by Shropshire Council. Volunteers to charge and move the signs were needed and those interested should contact the Clerk.

New Tasks for the Environmental Maintenance Contractor: general winter maintenance of drains.
