





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CHURCH NEWS

LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

Easter can fall on any date between 22nd March and 25th April. It's always a Sunday and depends on the date of the first full moon on or after 21st March. This year it falls on 20th April: relatively late in the possible range. This, in turn, affects the date of Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent – this year Wednesday 5th March. This means we will have about a month of what the church calls 'Ordinary Time' during February and the first few days of March. Ordinary time is basically those periods of the year when we are not marking a special church season – Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent or Easter. The seasonal hangings in our churches will be green, a reminder of the life that surrounds us increasingly as we move towards the spring, with longer days and (hopefully) finer weather.

I often feel that calling any period 'ordinary' time is something of a misnomer. I am writing this on a Sunday afternoon in January, and today's reading is about the transformation Jesus brought to the potential disaster at a wedding in Cana. Earlier today the first three hostages were released by Hamas, I have spoken to several couples about their weddings, and to someone else who recently found out that their illness is terminal. To what extent can we describe any time as 'ordinary'? At any time, some of us will be experiencing some of the many joys that life can bring whilst others experience some of the challenges. Quite a few of us may experience the joys and the challenges at the same time in different parts of our lives, some of which will be short-term, others will be longer-lasting.

Through it all Christians believe that we have the presence of God with us, walking alongside us as Christ walked alongside his disciples on the road to Emmaus. That presence of God with us won't take our problems away but may help us to bear them more easily knowing that we are not alone. God can be hard to perceive in the midst of all that daily life throws at us – one of the reasons why our church buildings are open to all every day and also why our services are open to all who wish to come – in times that are joyful, times that are challenging and times that are just ordinary.

Arvo Pärt reaches 90 and to celebrate his work we will sing The Deer's Cry and The Woman with the Alabaster Box.



CORVEDALE BOOK GROUP

THE DICTATOR'S WIFE BY FREYA BERRY



Cambridge graduate Freya Berry worked as a Reuters journalist, including in New York, where she reported on the 2016 US election. She left to research and write this novel, her first, also continuing to write for other journalistic outlets. Her observations of Melania Trump, Jill Biden and Michelle Obama, plus close consideration of the wives of some of the world's most autocratic leaders, including Asma al-Assad, Elena Ceaușescu, Eva Perón and Imelda Marcos, provided inspiration for the novel. Mostly set in 1993, it is told in the first person by Laura Lazarescu, a young London lawyer of Yanussian descent, who travels to Yanussia a tiny, imaginary country 'squashed between Romania, Hungary and Serbia' as part of the legal team called in to defend Marija Popa, widow of former dictator, Constantin Popa. Marija is charged with money laundering, bribery, fraud and corruption. Laura's story starts and finishes in 2018, after Marija's death, and she reflects back on events in 1993. She had wanted to find out more about why her parents had left Yanussia and what had led her initially loving mother to reject her daughter and try to stop her from going back.

There are parallels with life under the Ceauşescus and other dictatorships, where there was little trust between people and fear of being reported to the authorities was routine. Much of the novel is dark and chilling. Our discussion compared

this to what we happily describe as modern democracies, voicing different perspectives on just how free we really are in the West. Some of the dynamics of power, performance and sexism at issue in *The Dictator's Wife* may not be as unique to autocracies as the West would like to tell itself.

Marija, whose trademark is a red dress, presents as hot and cold, innocent and guilty, evil and good, all at different times, making it hard for the defence team to work out whether she should be convicted or acquitted. Her failure to co-operate with them does not help. Was she complicit in the dark acts of her late husband or was she an innocent victim by association? She tells Laura that her marriage, far from being a bond of equal power, had in fact been one of enslavement and terror. However, we all felt that she was very much complicit.

We discussed how glamorous spouses might be used by tyrants to soften their image, how they could be survivors of brutal patriarchy and lack genuine political power, but also have blood on their own hands. Laura cannot resist Marija's magnetic and controlling allure, even though she knows she's being lured into a spider's trap. She is prepared to do whatever it takes to dig out the truth, however much it hurts. We felt some of the plot and some relationships were unconvincing, the pace was often slow, the use of imagery was at times excessive and there were unnecessary elements that promised additional themes but led nowhere. There were characters whose roles were not developed and we agreed that the book would have benefited from more radical editing. Very mixed views, but another book we could not wholeheartedly recommend.



CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT

OFF TO OCCITANIA

These days we think of France as stretching from the North Sea to the Mediterranean and from Spain to Italy, but this was not the case in ancient times. So welcome to Occitania, a vast swathe of land comprising what we today think of as southern France. This was not a kingdom but a series of duchies, the western part being occupied by the powerful Aquitaine Duchy. Both the culture and the language (the *Langue d'Oc*) of Occitania were a fusion of the Latin Celtic, and Gaulish culture, as opposed to 'Francia', a fusion of the Frankish and Latin. This area is substantially larger than modern Languedoc.



At a time when Ludlow was, perhaps, only in the planning stage, there arose in Aquitaine a remarkable figure. By a strange chance Eleanor became the ruler (Duchess) of Aquitaine and at the age of thirteen was

married to the King of France. Langue d'Oc was of course her mother tongue and, it is said, her sons Richard and John (both later Kings of England) knew that language first. Later in life Eleanor apparently apologised for her poor French – she had learnt it only in England despite having been Queen of France! Her marriage to the French King was a disaster and, as soon as it had been dissolved, she married one Henry Plantagenet... who then only went on to be King of England! Throughout her long life (to say it was colourful would hardly be sufficient), this double queen was by turns de facto regent of England, negotiator on a massive stage, conspirator, 16 year prisoner and tireless wheeler-dealer, especially in favour of her sons and against her husbands. An instance is when she raised insane amounts of cash to ransom her son Richard – he of the Lion Heart – from a German prison.

In our own times Occitania has gained some recognition as a region (Occitanie) of France, albeit somewhat smaller than the old language area, perhaps in an effort to forestall any moves towards a nationalist movement.

So why is it worth us knowing about all this? Even on slight acquaintance it's pretty clear that the south is *different*: the land, climate, sense of place and deep history.

I think there is reason for saying it gave a big push to English history: when Henry and Eleanor tied the knot (1154) his lands and her dowry, fused, formed a vast empire that flowed from the Scottish Border to the Mediterranean. We were part of the power bloc with a remarkable queen, who did what queens were supposed to do, in other words quickly produced boy heirs (you could say she was too successful in that sense – but that is another story!). She was also said to be a great beauty, forceful, quixotic, and uncontainable: impossible no doubt, but some woman; a shock-wave hitting the staid Anglo-Norman upper crust and English populous alike.

Locally, I like to think that we can see something of a tidal



wave of exoticism that must have broken over England in the middle of the 12th century. Here is an example of the outrageously florid and boisterous style of the 'Herefordshire School': a carved font at Eardisley wrought by Occitan masons. But surely the most famous and riotous example is Kilpeck Church, south of Hereford, where the exterior of the church is covered in a profusion of astonishingly energetic carving.

I must confess I do like to imagine another 'Eleanor effect', although this is pure speculation! She came as queen to England 94 years after the conquest of 1066. The English language had had, to put it mildly a rough ride. All the powerful (aristocracy, higher levels of the church) were Francophone. Official documents, law and proclamations were in French or Latin. The monoglot English person was (you get the impression) seen as somewhere between an earthworm and an amoeba.

All of this was to change in the decades and centuries to follow. English was, in many ways, to swallow its rivals and rise again to a remarkable place. No doubt the old guard were trying to hold on to a superior, urbane French, but *just perhaps* it became fashionable even *cool* to speak in a different way. Maybe it was not going to be too long before that old school French was going to be a bit of a laughing-stock!

NEWS FROM SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL

TURBULENT TIMES AHEAD?

I reported in December that Shropshire's Local Plan was halted on the instructions of the Planning Inspectorate. It took them ten weeks to explain that they disagreed with some of our site allocations, particularly regarding housing set aside for the Black Country. In the meanwhile the Government produced their new National Planning Policy Framework, which confirmed that Shropshire's annual housing figure needs to increase from 1073 to 1994 dwellings. This means that Shropshire Council, faced with such a large increase in annual housing numbers, can no longer meet its five-year land supply target.

A five-year land supply is a planning policy requirement for councils in England to ensure that enough land is allocated and available to meet the housing needs of their area over a rolling five year period. If Shropshire does not have enough land allocated (which, with such a large annual increase in allocation is now sadly inevitable), the county is open to applications from developers on sites currently outside the Local Plan provisions, provided the applications meet national and local planning policies.

This happened in Shropshire once before, in the early days of the Unitary Council, and resulted in a massive expansion of housebuilding in some areas – particularly Shifnal - which caused considerable problems in the town and required huge infrastructure investment to put right. It is hard to know how we are going to meet the requirements to build nearly 1,000 houses more per annum particularly as nationwide there are still shortages of materials, workers and equipment. However, it is early days yet and there may be negotiations to be had to reduce the allocation.

The English Devolution White Paper came out just before Christmas. The Government's ambition is to abolish all Councils other than Unitary Councils with a population of 500,000. County and District Councils due to hold elections in May 2025 were asked if they wished to delay their elections to enable them to prepare to join together into unitary authorities. Eighteen councils have agreed to delay.

Shropshire has elections on 1st May and we will go ahead with these.

We are not proving the most attractive partner to neighbouring authorities as a huge rural county with a population of only 323,000, an above average elderly population and no large towns. We understand we will receive a letter before the end of January instructing us to move into a combined authority – with whom we know not under a mayoral system. One question springs to mind from these ever-larger agglomerations: What price the 'Local' in Local Government?

Just to cheer everyone up even more, Shropshire has not done well from the Local Government Financial Settlement. We have had a 2.84% increase in core funding, against the national average funding increase for councils of 6%, with urban authorities benefitting the most. Shropshire received the third lowest increase out of more than 180 councils.

A key pressure for us is the loss of the Rural Services Delivery Grant, as well as a large reduction in social care funding, which leaves us with a loss of £16m. Nevertheless, in 2024/25 the Council is set to deliver £50m of savings, against a backdrop of the growing need for social care affecting councils countrywide. Due to Shropshire's size and rurality we are faced with extra costs for waste collection/disposal, housing, social services, education and our discretionary services.

One of the joys of life in Shropshire is its rurality; unfortunately, when people are spread out over such a large area it costs more to provide local services.

CARING FOR GOD'S ACRE



SNOWDROPS

I had a really lovely surprise on New Year's Day! Not a warm day, but on a brief walk down the garden I spotted a small group of snowdrops, under the hedge. They had a bit to go before their delicate white petals were slightly spread in that shy way that snowdrops have: not showing off, but what a treat to see.

Now into February and this tiny flower is in its element. Thou fairy gift from summer, Why art thou blooming now? asked the scandalous 19th century poet, Letitia Elizabeth Landon, in her poem, 'The Snowdrop'. A good question, as you would think any sensible plant would wait until the weather was warmer before flowering. Instead, the plant turns many a churchyard into fairyland in February.

Several churches in the county have 'Snowdrop Weekends' this month, usually about the third weekend, when the flowers are at their very best and a stunning sight, a carpet of white amongst the gravestones.

The Latin name for the snowdrop family or genus is 'galanthus,' finally agreed on in 1753, when botany was coming into its own as a science. But snowdrops were known about by the fourth century BCE in ancient Greece. The Greek author Theophrastus was describing the snowdrop and other similar flowers in such a way that, in the 21st century, we could identify what he was describing (when translated from ancient Greek: definitely not my forte!).

Galanthus nivalis is the best-known and most widespread of snowdrops, and it is native to a large area of Europe, stretching from the Pyrenees in the west, through France and Germany to Poland in the north, Italy, northern Greece, Bulgaria, Romania, Ukraine, Russia and Turkey. Several other species are found in Jordan, Lebanon, Syria and Palestine. Most Galanthus species grow best in woodland, so head for St Peter's church in Stanton Lacy for the best display in Shropshire! But your village churches may have them too.

In colder countries snowdrops flower later than January and February as they do in England. The Russian composer, Tchaikovsky, wrote a suite of twelve piano pieces, one for each month of the year. The pieces carry the name of the month, followed by something associated with it: the second part of the 'April' name is – snowdrop!

HELP/ADVICE NEEDED

Tugford church has recently undergone its Quinquennial inspection to ensure the building is in good condition and any necessary remedial work is attended to in a timely fashion. As a Grade II* listed building going back over 900 years, it is important that it is kept in good order, not only for church folk but also the many who gain benefit and enjoyment from our wonderful heritage buildings, with which Shropshire is particularly blessed.

Thankfully, St Catherine's is in generally good condition, having benefited from major internal and external restorations in recent years. The external restoration nearly ten years ago included a new roof and the installation of a French drain around the perimeter. There is now some evidence of rising damp in the internal walls of the bell tower and our architect recommends a CCTV camera survey of the French drain to ensure it is functioning properly.

We, the Churchwardens, are at a slight loss as to where to obtain this expertise and wondered whether there is anyone locally who can help, either personally or by pointing us in the right direction. Any advice would be greatly appreciated.



SHROPSHIRE RURAL SUPPORT

DOING NOTHING IS NOT AN OPTION

Shropshire is one of the most beautiful counties in England from the Teme Valley to the Long Mynd to the rolling land in the north of the county. The farms that make up and manage this beautiful pastoral scene are run by farmers and their families who are in one of the most stressful and, at times, isolated of occupations with amongst the highest levels of suicide in the UK.

Many of the farms are multigenerational family businesses with up to three generations working together on the farm with all the ups and downs of running a family businesses with the added complication of living on top of each other. Also, not only do they have to put up with vagaries of the weather, but also with continually changing government regulations and the dominance of the supermarkets controlling prices.

Some thirty years ago, in a year when suicide incidents peaked in Shropshire, Shropshire Rural Support was set up to support farmers, their families and people living and working in rural Shropshire at times of need. The enquiries we receive cover both business issues and personal issues including bereavement, loneliness, domestic abuse, family fallouts, succession and divorce. Our role is to ensure the caller is signposted to a safe place where they can access the help that they need to address their particular issue, though sometimes it is a case of our being there to listen.

Shropshire Rural Support We are a self-funding charity run by volunteers, most of whom have a farming background and understand the issues of running a farm. Assisted by the volunteers the dayto-day operation is delivered by two part-time

coordinators and the support service is available 24/7/365 via a freephone helpline which ensures that whatever the timeof-day people can readily access our confidential service. For

those, particularly the younger generation, who prefer to text message rather than talking on a phone, we have recently launched a free confidential 24/7/365 text messaging helpline.

CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ORDINARY MEETING ON TUESDAY 7TH JANUARY 2025

Present: Councillors Mr M Seabrook (Chair), Mr A Pike (Vice Chair), Mr I Alderson, Mrs C Byng, Mrs M Holland, Ms J Mear, Mr I Steele. In Attendance: Cllr C Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO) and one member of the public.

Apologies for Absence: Cllrs Mr J Turley and Ms J Watts.

Declarations of Interest relating to this meeting: None.

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 5th November 2024 were agreed as being correct and were signed by the Chair.

Reports from Members: Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley reported that the government wanted to see much more delegation of decisions to planning officers when applications conformed to the Local Plan. However, Shropshire's Local Plan inspection was terminated, and the Council had not yet been informed of the reason. This also left the five-year land supply plan in limbo. The government was only increasing rural funding by 2.4%, compared to urban areas receiving 9%. The Rural Services Grant had been removed. The government's plans for more devolved areas were proving difficult for Shropshire Council as it was struggling to find other councils to join up with. Social Care was experiencing issues as the increase in employers' National Insurance was impacting upon the providers, but SC was not able to increase the funding to assist them. Cllr Steele asked Cllr Motley about 'land banking' by developers - if this land could be released it would provide more building land. Cllr Motley agreed. Cllr Steele also raised concerns about the sewage pipe plans in Bishops Castle which would affect the River Onny. Cllr Motley would investigate whether Shropshire Council was planning to challenge Severn Trent's plans. Cllrs encouraged members of the public to sign the petition and the Council would write to Severn Trent to express its concerns about the plans.

Village Hall Committee - Cllr Mear reported that there were lots of events planned for the year ahead. The committee was concentrating on marketing the hall and applying for funding for the extension. It was also continuing to work on the governing document.

South Shropshire Area Committee - H Coonick (Clerk) read out the minutes: Juan Hernandez of StreetScene had made a presentation on his work in improving the FixMyStreet app. Chris Mellings had replaced Dianne Dorrell as Chief Officer of SALC and planned to refresh the website, encourage councils to share good news and good practice and build relationships between SALC, local MP's and members of the House of Lords. Cllr Archer asked whether Shropshire Council could remove the restrictions on the Environmental Maintenance Contractors working on B roads. Mr Mellings had agreed to discuss this with Shropshire Council. Cllr Holman noted that Shropshire was at the bottom of most of the policing performance measures within West Mercia. It was suggested that PCC John Campion be invited to the next meeting to speak about police performance in Shropshire. The committee would also consider how to promote the importance of residents standing as councillors ahead of the elections in May.

Flooding: The report of the Seifton Lane Joint FAG/Parish Council site visit had been sent to Cllr Motley and Mr Bellis (Shropshire Council). Mr Bellis had asked for a site visit to meet with a landowner to discuss ways to mitigate flooding on Seifton Lane. Cllr Steele said the Slow the Flow structures in Seifton Bache were unable to deal with the level of flooding. Cllr Alderson considered that diverting the route of the brook would not work as in flood situations rivers tend to revert to their original route.

The Clerk would attend the meeting with Mr Bellis to discuss the benefit of desilting Seifton Brook in 2025. A decision was deferred to the next meeting.

Tree Preservation Order (TPO) on the Limes and Pines Opposite Culmington Village Hall: Cllr Seabrook had approached Natural Environment and Martin Sutton (county arboriculturist at Shropshire Council) to see if a TPO would be possible.

Reduction of the 40mph Speed Limit on the B4365: Members agreed to add a reduction to the speed limit on the B4365 to 30mph to the Place Plan and send the request to Nick Newton (Traffic Engineer for Shropshire Council).

Use of the Neighbourhood Fund for extending the speed limit to beyond Clay Lane: Shropshire Council reported that due to staffing changes and a reduced ability to deliver projects the development of the new policy had been delayed. It recognised that many Parish and Town Councils wished to use the fund for this purpose and advised that CPC reiterated the request with the portfolio holder for highways.

It was agreed to contact the Highways Portfolio Holder to ask that the Neighbourhood Fund be allowed to be used to fund highways signage.

Nominations to the Lord-Lieutenant's Shropshire Garden Party 2025: the clerk would make a nomination and once it was accepted she would inform the council.

Update on the Blocked Bridleway: The Rights of Way team at Shropshire Council reported on 6th January 2025 that they had no further information to update the council. It was agreed to ask the Rights of Way Officer what legal action would be taken to ensure that this Bridleway was open for the public to use.

Finance: Expenditure was within the budget except for a slight overspend on insurance. As at 6th November 2024 the bank account held £12,342.02. The report was accepted, and the bank reconciliation was signed by Cllrs Holland and Byng.

It was agreed to remain with Lloyds and pay the new monthly fee of ± 4.25 . A savings account would be investigated.

The budget and precept for 2025-2026 were set at £5,064.33 which was approximately a 2.73% increase on the previous year.

A payment to D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Invs 666 & 676 ± 117.00 was authorised.

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 27TH NOVEMBER 2024 AT DIDDLEBURY VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllr D Hedgley – Chairman. Cllrs A Rattu, A Watson, C Martyn, S Povall, T O'Boyle, T Pardoe and R Morgan.

Apologies: Shropshire Cllr C Motley.

In attendance: The Clerk and five members of the public.

Declarations of Interest: None were made.

Public Involvement Session: PC 23440 Henry King-Salter

attended the meeting to introduce himself as the new Community Police Officer. Although based at Church Stretton his area covered Craven Arms and surrounding parishes including Diddlebury. His contact mobile number was 07483 140311 and his email: henry. king-salter@westmercia.police.uk.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 23rd October 2024 were approved and matters arising dealt with.

Reports: The Chairman reported on his attendance at a community meeting in Craven Arms, and on his completion of a consultation from SC concerning banners and notices advertising local events.

Westhope Village Hall: Mrs Worthington said the event on 23rd November featuring the Newtown Male Voice Choir had been

cancelled due to flooding and would be re-scheduled in the New Year. Bingo, skittles and whilst drives continue to be well attended.

Flood Action Group: Cllr Martyn reported on the flooding on 24th November. Three houses in Bache Mill were flooded as was the B4368 on the bridge. He was submitting a full report to the Highways Engineer. He would suggest a depth gauge be sited in the bridge.

Diddlebury Village Hall: Cllr S Povall reported further on complaints from some local residents about damage to their drives caused by DVH car park users. The Chairman noted that DPC no longer owns any part of the car park, having transferred its interest to the Official Custodian of Charities in 2016.

Planning Applications: 24/04312/FUL - Application for change of use from agricultural portal frame building to office, gym, stores, toilets, showers and games room and all associated work at Westhope Country Retreats, Middle Westhope Farm, Westhope. Councillors supported this application.

24/04151/FUL – Application for erection of a dwelling for single disabled occupancy, access drive and parking on land southeast of No 11 Corfton Bache. Councillors supported the application with a caveat that a restriction be placed on the property to prevent it being sold as an open market development.

Highways/Environmental Issues: A response to DPC's Freedom of Information Request about flooding on the B4368 had been received and considered by councillors. Flood alleviation measures were discussed at length. Craven Arms Depot would be contacted to see if free sandbags were available to residents. The possible introduction of beavers in the Corvedale was discussed. Cllr Martyn would attend a meeting at Culmington shortly when this issue would be discussed, and he would report back to the January meeting.

Cllr Watson was concerned that traffic lights had been set up on the B4368 at Pedlars Rest for four days and were sited on the highway,

causing traffic to swerve to avoid collisions. No work appeared to have been carried out justifying the traffic lights apart from two Severn Trent tankers being parked there for part of one day.

Communications And Correspondence: Six items or correspondence were considered.

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for November and part December 2024 was considered and cheques totalling £1,145.73 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds totalling £14,748.92. Cllr O'Boyle verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC's bank statement.

A draft of DPC's 2025/2026 Precept Budget was considered. A final version of the budget would be considered and approved at the meeting on 22nd January 2025

Any Other Business: The Chairman raised concerns that SWS had been given a contract by Shropshire Council to provide Broadband coverage in the Corvedale, but had transferred the contract to VONEUS, who had been extremely difficult to contact. There had been frequent problems with Broadband coverage especially in the Bouldon area, but VONEUS was seemingly not interested in solving the problems.

It was agreed that the Resolution passed in January 2019 concerning open market development in Corfton needed to be revised and would be an Agenda item in January 2025.

The next Parish Council meeting would be on Wednesday 22nd January 2025 at 7.30pm at Diddlebury Village Hall. There would be no meeting in December.

Open Session: No matters were raised.

Minutes of the meeting held on Thursday 8th August 2024 were read by the Chair and unanimously agreed as correct.

Co-option of a new councillor: Mr Oliver Uffold, who lives within Abdon, had put himself forward. Cllr Lewis proposed co-option of Mr Uffold. This was seconded by Cllr Hartley and unanimously agreed. The Declaration of Acceptance of Office was completed.

Reports from Members: SALC: Cllr Lewis reported on the meeting about 'FixMyStreet' and suggested an advert on the website explaining the full range of activities it covered: signs, stray dogs etc. This was agreed. Internet coverage was questioned: Cllr Motley would speak to Ben Walker at Shropshire Council as there were some deals available funded by the government. A member of the public suggested that all residents needed to complain so that companies had a true record of the issue. The Village Hall

mirror had been folded up by Mr Steere as the Parish Council hadn't been updated. PPG: two partners were now on board plus Dr Bassett and a third would be recruited. The next meeting would be on 29th October. The Community Benefit Society remained interested in the purchase of the building. Cllr Motley reported that Shropshire Council was keen for devolution which was a concern due to Shropshire's large size but low population, and low number businesses. Shropshire's elderly and children's social care were high costs at the moment. Cllr Motley would not be standing at the next elections in May, after 22 years.

Highways/Highway Maintenance Officer: The Clerk reported that Mr Clayton was unavailable. It was agreed unanimously that the Clerk would contact alternatives requesting a quote for a few days' work.

Correspondence: Shropshire Local Nature Recovery Strategy: Cllr Lewis reported on an email and public survey, which would be added to the website. The Clerk would forward it to Cllr Motley.

AOB: Cllr Price made a request for confirmation of locations of gateways away from public highways and footpaths. Maps were presented. The Clerk would draft an email for approval by councillors.

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
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
