





LETTER FROM THE RECTORY

At the end of June this year I escaped from the rain at home and spent a mostly sunny week in Bayeux, in Normandy. It was a poignant time to be there as the commemorations of the 80th anniversary of D-Day had taken place shortly before, and in many places the decorations put up were still to be seen. Wandering around the Normandy countryside, and visiting towns and villages, it was difficult to reconcile the peaceful scenes in front of me with the images displayed of how the same places had looked eighty years ago as battle raged on the landing grounds and in the streets. Visiting the D-Day landings museum in Arromanches-les-Bains, site of one of the Mulberry Harbours, it was impossible not to be impressed by the ingenuity and determination which went into designing and implementing the whole plan. At the same time, the cost of war was brought home by seeing the seemingly endless lists of names on the British Normandy Memorial and the rows of headstones in the British Cemetery in Bayeux.

If we needed a reminder of the cost of war, we get it all too much as we see and hear the news - from the area around the Holy Land and from Ukraine. In both of these situations it is difficult to see an end. As we hear that so far about 41,000 Palestinians have died in Gaza it is easy to see it as just a number and to lose sight of the suffering brought to families and communities - on both sides - many of whom have simply been unfortunate enough to be trying to live their lives in places that turned into battlefields.

On **Sunday 10th November** we will gather at Culmington at 10:50am for the Service of Remembrance in which we not only remember those who died fighting in two World Wars, but we also pray for places affected by war now and pledge ourselves to strive for all that makes for peace. Individually, there is little that most of us can do to bring peace to Ukraine, Gaza or any of the other places affected by war and conflict, but we can pray, and we can support those who are in a position to help people who are suffering and in need. We invite you to join us at Culmington on Remembrance Sunday or on Armistice Day, **Monday 11th**, when we gather at 10:50am by the war memorials in Diddlebury and Munslow to remember those from our communities who died so that we can live in peace – and pray for those who long for peace to come in their lands too.

EXACTLY WHAT YOU MEANBY BEN HINSHAW

It has been written that in this extraordinary debut a cast of characters grapple with unexpected betrayal, the loss of innocence and the lies we tell; that Ben Hinshaw (with sharp insight) illuminates the unnerving nature of what it means to grow up, to be a teenager playing at adulthood and an adult playing games. In fact, Hilary Mantel is quoted as saying that 'Sentence by sentence, Ben Hinshaw offers wit, sensitivity and sharp observation. Then slowly the reader sees the grand design – the intricate, braided storylines, sustained with energy and relish. It is entertaining, and something more – truly involving, like a whole novel sequence cleverly condensed'.

The book is indeed constructed in an interesting way: is it a novel with chapters or is it a collection of eleven separate stories that are linked with a common setting or relationship to Guernsey and a loose thread that connects each of the characters? The 'stories' certainly range widely: from a teenager who discovers a secret and finds his betrayal has the power to ruin lives; to a marriage shot through with infidelity and the subsequent quest for revenge; to a young veteran in California who struggles with the trauma of war and seeks solace at a local ranch. The interlinked stories certainly explore life and all its messiness, the loss, the lies and the lessons.

At the start you are unaware of the book's structure, so it was disconcerting to find that the second chapter appeared unconnected to the first and as the book progressed you realised that there is no overarching storyline nor final resolution. In fact, only by reading the acknowledgements at the end did we discover that some stories were previously published in slightly different forms in different publications. How and why they have been put together to create this particular book is unknown but it might explain our feeling that the stories did not hang well together. We found it a distraction that we had to stop and think, to go back to find where we had met a character before to work out where he or she fitted into the whole scheme.

Yet, in a different sense, the book is easy to read, each story being about twenty pages, and it was felt that the individual stories probably had more merit than the book as a whole. Certain stories had more appeal than others and it can be argued that the author added more depth to the characters by having them show up in passing in other people's stories, at different stages in their lives. 'A brave debut', wrote The Times, '..the exercise of working out how the web threads together is part of the pleasure of this book...'. Beautifully written or a shapeless narrative? You need to read it for yourselves to make your own minds up!

The Corvedale Book Group meets next on **Thursday 14th November** in Diddlebury Village Hall at 7.30pm to discuss American Wife by Curtis Sittenfeld. New members are always welcome.

CARING FOR GOD'S ACRE



ST MARTIN

The end of the year is nigh, or, in modern English, only two months to go until 2025!

Remembrance Day is the focal point of November, the 11th day of the 11th month, and rightly so I think. But, in days before WWI, the date meant a different thing altogether: the feast of St Martin of Tours.

Martin was born in modern-day Hungary, sometime between 316 and 336AD. He is a saint we have details about, not myths! His biography was written by a contemporary scholar and friend of his called Sulpicius Severus who travelled with him and his entourage.

Once converted to Christianity, Martin set about being as good a Christian as possible. He was kind and considerate to all. Wherever he went he was instantly liked and loved. He travelled widely across Western Europe and eventually became pally with Hilary of Poitiers, who was the Bishop of the French city of Tours. Martin would follow him into the job later.



One story about Martin spread like wildfire. He came across a poor man begging. The man was poorly dressed and shivering with cold. Martin took off his rich red cloak and taking his sword cut it in half. He handed

one piece to the beggar and wrapped the other piece around himself. There is no doubt about it: Martin was the poster-boy of his era and generation!

England did not miss out on this amazing man. His feast day for many centuries was a quarter day in the calendar when tenants paid rent to their landlords. It was accompanied by dancing, mumming, drinking and general merriment. It was also a last chance for finding a job, a hiring. This custom faded during the 19th century as Michaelmas became the autumn rent day.

Meanwhile, back in France, the people of Tours obviously knew a potential Bishop when they saw one. After the death of Hilary they prevented Martin from leaving the city and quickly made him their new Bishop. Again, Martin made a good job of his new post. He was perceived as honest, a fair judge, and a man of the people.

After his death, a St Martin cult grew across Europe. More churches were named after Martin than any other Saint - still true today. In France alone hundreds of villages and towns have St Martin in their names.

Shropshire shares this idea too. Not far from Oswestry, in the north of the county, is the village of St Martin, with a medieval church of the same name. It is a member of Shropshire Churches Tourism Group (SCTG) and so is welcoming to visitors and well worth a visit. Monday 11th November would be a good day (but other days are available!).

DIDDLEBURY FLOOD ACTION GROUP

THE STORM - 16TH OCTOBER 2024

Now it's a case of clearing up the mess and assessing individually what can be done to further protect our properties.

CORVEDALE GARDEN GROUP

VAYNOR PARK



Once again on Corvedale Garden Group day it was raining fifteen as headed members to Vaynor Park, near Welshpool, and we were cheered to see it stop in time for us to enjoy all aspects of

the fabulous five-acre garden and landscape. It is hard to describe how stunning the magnificent views are, enhanced, as Katy told us, by removing some of the trees to widen the vista over Wales and Shropshire when she moved in over thirty years ago. The house was also fascinating - built of brick in the 1600s with a Victorian extension to the front.

We were guided round by Katy Corbett-Winder who owns and manages the garden with some help from a gardener twice a week. She had redesigned some of the planting when she moved in to develop more natural and flowing borders which suited the landscape perfectly. The south facing long herbaceous borders although past their summer best were still beautiful, almost impressionistic in the damp of the day. They are filled with cosmos, cardoons, crambe, geraniums, salvia, sambucus nigra, phlox, astrantia and geums to name but a few. On seeing the autumnal cardoons, I suggested an artist might paint them and Katy told me she was an artist and in fact had! Always curious I looked her up and found a painting of the cardoons, so take a look at her website if you are interested. www.katecorbettwinder.com

There is a formality to parts of the garden which includes box edged rose parterres and banks of hydrangeas, topiary yew birds, box buttresses and spires. The courtyard with lime green Hydrangea paniculata and Annabelle were a vibrant autumnal delight and as we entered the garden into the courtyard, we were greeted by a gingko and one of the members was heard to say, on seeing it, that she knew the garden would be good, and she was right.







The box edged rose parterre was laid out in 1867 and contains a mix of old varieties and new English roses, underplanted with cosmos and nicotiana. I overheard some interesting exchanges of ideas about how to manage box blight and our youngest gardener enjoyed running around the parterres.

The soil is acid and is ideal for the banks of blue hydrangeas that from August flower through the autumn which we explored as we enjoyed the woodland areas, also spotting the delightful cyclamen nests at the base of some of the trees. Separating the herbaceous borders from the parterres is a long straight grass area

which was known as the Victorian Archery Lawn.

We would like to thank Katy for the wonderful tour, and we look forward to the last garden group event of this year on **Saturday 9th November** in Diddlebury Village Hall at 10.00am when Kevin Alviti will be talking about unusual fruit and veg - please come along. FOOTPATH MAINTENANCE GROUP

Since then, we've repaired or replaced stiles at North Sutton, Fernhall Mill, Heath, Munslow and on the footpath from the junction at Peaton that comes down to the big footbridge near Broncroft Lodge farm and goes on to Aston Munslow. This path is not easy to access, as we do everything by hand, so it has taken us quite a few months. In June, we did as much clearing around stiles as we could manage, but everything seemed to have grown so much more than I've noticed in previous years, some stiles had almost disappeared in the undergrowth! Whether this was due to the wet and fairly mild winter, who knows?

I have been a member of the Corvedale Footpath Group for over twenty years now and have been the co-ordinator for the last six years or so. We started when John Farley developed the Corvedale Three Castles Walk, which took a few years to finish and was finally completed in 2006. After that, we merged into being one of Shropshire Council's P3 groups, (Parish Paths Partnership) so were able to continue with their support. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time with the group, and have found it very satisfying work, however, time is passing, and as we all know, we don't get any younger! However satisfying it is, the work is heavy and hard manual labour, and I am now finding that it is too much for me to cope with these days. So, it is with a heavy heart that I have decided to stand down at the end of this year. There is no-one able to take over as leader, so I'm afraid from December there will be no Footpath Maintenance Group covering the parishes of Diddlebury, Munslow and Tugford and Abdon in the Corvedale.



CORVEDALE PAST & PRESENT

PSALM 66: HE TURNETH THE SEA INTO DRY LAND

Last month I recalled an incident involving wading through sea water to reach our destination.

As every schoolchild knows, one molecule of oxygen teams up with two molecules of hydrogen to make the water molecule



and it's interesting stuff. It turns out that if we draw it on a piece of paper it looks a bit like this (I am just hoping not too many chemists read this). The angle

between the bonds is a constant – it's all to do with mysterious electron clouds ...uhm... clever!

From everyday life we know that water exists in many forms; liquid, droplet, solid, crystalline, vaporous, tense surface and, most interesting of all, intracellular, of which more anon. This 'classic' shape can metamorphose when water, for instance, freezes.

This substance is the commonest in our bodies by a country mile. We have always needed it, yet, as we know all too often, excess of water brings flooding and destruction, and lack of water is even worse.

Throughout a long history on earth we've had an intimate relationship with the wet stuff, but starting a few thousand years ago we've increasingly tried to master it, draining, canalising, piping, sailing over and through. Eastern Britain – especially Scotland – is a classic example of terrain which has snubbed its nose at water. We have done our usual thing; learned a bit and think we're on the verge of knowing everything.

A couple of years ago I fell off my bike! Straight away I couldn't move my arm, and despite a gash the limb wasn't swollen. A couple or three days later it was very swollen. All the knackered cells had discharged their water, but it was not something that Seven Trent would recognise!

Almost every part of the body is made up of cells. In health, they are plump active bundles of energy and constructive chemistry, guarded by a double cell membrane which, crudely, keeps the good stuff in and the bad out, whilst also managing to expel waste to (extra-cellular) water outside the cells. Life is dependent on the integrity of this system. The cell is full of little

helpers: mitochondria (the cells' battery packs), endoplasmic reticulum, proteins factories, nucleoli, genetic banks, together with a great swirling dance of proteins and charged ions doing whatever they do. As I understand it, the water is not sloshing around: intracellular water is akin to a gel which when released takes time to change into something like your bathwater. That's why it took my arm days to swell.

Some would say that one of the biggest contemporary dangers we face is not something you will ever hear about on the 10 o'clock news. It is the narrowing of science that backs up technology and industry. My old profession of medicine is a prime example. If a miracle happened and I were asked to talk at a high-profile meeting I would be asked to give a list referenced from a narrow range of 'approved' journals to justify the points I would be making. How Joe Stalin would have approved! This sort of thing is packaging dogma and unconscious automatic behaviour. I tell you this because there are now brilliant people trying to step out of the straitjacket, and water is a topic of great interest to many of them. Just to give you a taste, water vapour has an interesting part to play in earth's homeostasis, (keeping it on an even keel, sort of important these days... no?), while brave souls have shown and told how water has memory. I am fascinated to know the electromagnetic energies and other fields around us which help form us, sense the world, let us know we are alive, store memory etc. affect the water in our cells in interesting places such as the brain!! Could the fixed 'constant' of water structure be challenged?

Water has been a massive part of our cultural, religious and spiritual past, from the Vedic traditions of India to old John the Baptist near drowning people in the Jordan to reset their lives! In a nutshell, water is so much more than an item on your list of direct debits.

We were happy to welcome our speakers for the evening, Sam and Kate Davies, who offered their talk on modern day self-sufficiency, A Good Life, explaining how over the last twenty years they achieved their goal to become as self-sufficient and sustainable as possible. It all started with an allotment! Having developed a growing desire to live more sustainably, they moved to buy a property with some land, proceeding to develop their skills. They described the many daily, weekly and seasonal tasks they have to do, from making compost in an old concrete mixer with ingredients including mole hill soil and leaf mould instead of peat, to managing year-round crop rotation, and finally storing their produce using preserving, freezing and cold storage techniques. Not much opportunity to go on holiday! Kate, being skilled in cheesemaking, preserving and looking after their beehives, brought along her homemade honey for us to buy. With so many techniques and tips for gardeners and budding allotmenteers, the talk was very inspiring.

NEWS FROM SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL

There's a lot going on in the council at the moment as we strive to improve our very difficult financial position.

GREEN WASTE BINS CHARGING SCHEME

The Council has received over 50,000 requests from residents to retain their green waste bins at a charge of £56 per bin per annum. You will have heard that there have been a few hiccups with the rollout of this scheme: the company contracted to produce the sticky labels for subscribers failed to ensure the labels were sticky enough! As a result they fell off the bins. The council has speedily withdrawn this contract and re-let it to a company which can meet the label stickiness criteria. Tiresome though this is, it has the advantage of allowing everyone with a green bin a further month's free usage until the charging scheme starts on 4th November. You may rest assured that the Council will not be paying for the defective stickers. The new stickers are now arriving through the post, and I can confirm that mine was super-sticky.

We have had some queries about green bins in churchyards. These are not exempt from payment but can be added to the system on request and applicants should email waste.management@shropshire.gov.uk for information. If there is no postbox available for the delivery of a sticker, please let the Council know and we can arrange another suitable delivery address.

NOTICE OF A CASE OF BLUE TONGUE DISEASE IN SHROPSHIRE

Shropshire farmers are being asked to be alert to a case of Blue Tongue in the county. The advice from Shropshire Council's Animal Health Team follows an announcement from DEFRA who have confirmed a single case of Blue Tongue disease in Shropshire.

At the moment Shropshire has not been placed under a disease control zone. The affected premises is currently under movement restrictions and the animal has been culled. Blue Tongue is a notifiable disease which primarily affects sheep, cattle, other ruminants (such as deer and goats) and camelids such as llamas and alpacas.

If you suspect Blue Tongue, you are asked to report it immediately by calling 03000 200 301. If you need more information and updates, please go to Bluetongue: news, information and guidance for livestock keepers – GOV.UK (www.gov.uk) or contact your local veterinary surgery.

DEVOLUTION

On a completely different subject, the issue of devolved local authorities has reared its head again. You may remember the previous government was keen to see fewer, larger authorities throughout England. This theme has been picked up by the current government which also wants to see mayoralties introduced like some of the large urban areas such as Birmingham and the Black Country, Teesside and Greater Manchester.

This poses a problem for Shropshire as a large rural authority with a relatively small population, no large cities, and a higher than average population of over-65s and over-85s. Whilst Shropshire has a vibrant small and medium sized business sector we lack large companies, and our connectivity and public transport need improving, although we have ambitious plans to tackle these shortcomings.

Shropshire's Leader, Lezley Picton, has had a long discussion with the new Leader of Telford & Wrekin Council. Whilst nothing is ruled in or out it is more likely that Telford would look towards the West Midlands Combined Authority, which is not such an obvious proposition for Shropshire. Our Leader therefore proposes to hold talks with Herefordshire, Warwickshire, Worcestershire and Staffordshire to explore possibilities for a viable combined authority. One idea, supported by the West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner, is a possible devolution deal based on the West Mercia authorities (which includes Shropshire). Early days yet, but plenty to discuss.

FAREWELL TO SHIREHALL

You may have heard that Shropshire Council has taken the decision to move from Shirehall to the Guildhall at Frankwell in Shrewsbury. The Shirehall is not fit for purpose; it is extremely expensive to run and to heat, since the windows are single-glazed and draughty and the air conditioning/heating erratic. Since Covid many staff now work part time at home or in offices in the market towns, and the building, which was originally designed to accommodate some 4,000 staff now has nearer 200 working there regularly, not including other organisations to whom we let space. The building costs around £1.3m to run annually and this is just not economic in difficult times.

Thus, the decision has been taken to vacate Shirehall and move into the Guildhall over a three-month period, with the move hopefully completed in February. It will be the end of an era, but times move on, requirements change, and we need to move with them.

DIDDLEBURY PARISH COUNCIL

SUMMARY OF THE DRAFT MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 25TH SEPTEMBER 2024 AT WESTHOPE VILLAGE HALL

Present: Cllr R Povall, - acting Chairman for the meeting, Cllrs R Morgan, T Pardoe, A Watson, A Rattu, C Martyn.

Apologies: Cllrs T O'Boyle and D Hedgley.

In attendance: The Clerk, Shropshire Cllr C Motley and one

member of the public.

A Declarations of Interest was made by Cllr R Morgan relating to planning application 24/03253/FUL and he took no part in the discussion relating to it.

Public Involvement Session: Mrs Worthington had reported that the previous night, and without warning, the road up to Westhope had been closed from the B4368 as far as the cattery, which had disrupted an event at the village hall. Cllr R Povall had visited the site and found Severn Trent had closed the road to repair a leak. The Clerk raised the frequent closures of this road with Highways, emphasising the inconvenience it caused and also sought a progress report on the road from the college to Hillside Coppice which had been omitted from the recent resurfacing works. DPC was advised the work is scheduled for 2025-2026.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting on 24th July 2024 were approved by councillors.

Matters Arising: Cllr Rattu said there was still no response from Mr Nick Newton about the proposed traffic calming measures along the B4368. Cllr Motley advised she is having a meeting with the Highways management team tomorrow and would raise this issue. The Clerk said no plans had been received from Connexus relating to the three empty houses in Mill Lane. It was agreed a letter be sent to Connexus seeking a progress report. DPC was now aware that green waste bins would only be emptied from 1st October 2024 onwards if the householder had paid an annual fee of £56. No food waste was to go in the bins. The Shropshire recycling centres would remain open but from 4th November 2024 only Shropshire residents could use the sites and would need to telephone or email ahead to book a time slot, when they would be required to give their name, address and vehicle registration number. Admittance would be denied if an appointment had not been made.

Reports: The Chairman had submitted a written report for the meeting in which he said he had responded to the 'Local Services Future Options' survey, also to the Place Plan Update and to the Police & Crime Commissioner's practices survey, in which he urged more police presence in Diddlebury parish. He had attended Cllr Motley's Chairs' Meeting at Culmington on 10th September. He had written an article for the Corvedale News about the new playground and thanked Cllr Pardoe for obtaining and installing an awning for the picnic bench.

Clir Motley reported on the new planning measures being proposed by the Labour government. A considerable number of new houses was proposed, 70% of them in rural areas, but with no indication about the development of the infrastructure needed to support such houses. There was no mention of any enforcement measures relating to the vast number of sites on which permission had already been given but no work had commenced. There are 12 'land banked' sites in Diddlebury parish alone, Shirehall is being sold off as it was built to accommodate 4,500 workers but now barely 200 staff work at the Shirehall regularly. The staff were to relocate probably to the Guildhall.

Westhope Village Hall - Mrs Worthington reported on the many events held or being held at the hall. Mrs Mary Hall's passing had been commemorated by a minute's silence at a recent community

lunch. Grants were now being sought for replacement heaters.

Flood Action Group Report: Cllr Martyn reported on a FAG meeting held on 18th September which was poorly attended by locals despite extensive publicity. Remedial drainage works were being sought from the developer relating to the new site at Bache Mill. The possibility of a dam in Delbury Woods was discussed. A supply of Flood Warning signs were to be made available for areas susceptible to flooding. Flood water on the bridge on the B4368 and the blocked drainage system at Pinstones were discussed with the Highways representative. It was reported that flooding on the bridge on the B4368 had been exacerbated as some of the drains had been sealed by vandals inserting expanding foam into the outlets.

Planning Applications: 24/03023/FUL - Application for the erection of porch, steps and dwarf walls at Lower House Farm, Middlehope. Councillors supported this application.

24/03024/FUL - Application for the repair of existing timber frame and new lime render panels over existing brickwork at Lower House Farm, Middlehope. Councillors supported this application.

24/02804/PMBPA - Proposed change of use from an agricultural building to 2 dwelling houses south of Delbury Hall, Diddlebury. It was initially unclear how DPC was to deal with this application, so prior to the meeting the Chairman had established from the Planning Officers that they had taken a decision on it on 11th September 2024 and had refused permission on the grounds that it did not meet the permitted development criteria required for a PMBPA application. Thus, DPC needed to take no action on this application.

24/03253/FUL - Creation of two parking spaces on land adjacent to gravel drive to serve Jack's Cottage, Bache Mill. Councillors were unable to support this application.

Highways/Environmental Issues: The quotation from Mr J Woodhouse for strimming and cleaning works around the parish was approved. In addition to DPC's concerns about flooding on the bridge on the B4368, a request for assistance had been received from a resident of the Moors View about the frequent flooding of his property. The possible causes of the flooding were discussed and various views were aired. Cllr Rattu's property had suffered a lot of damage and since 2017 he had been trying to get action from SC. It was agreed that a Freedom of Information Request be sent to SC asking exactly what action they had taken about this perpetual problem, and specifically when any such action was taken.

 $\begin{tabular}{ll} \textbf{Communications and Correspondence:} Ten items were considered and noted. \end{tabular}$

Finance Matters: The Finance Report for August & September 2024 was considered and cheques totalling £1,596.87 were approved for payment, after which DPC held funds totalling £16,369.32, of which £928.46 were third party funds. Cllr Watson verified the reconciliation between DPC's cash book and HSBC's bank statements.

Any Other Business: Cllr R Povall confirmed the supply of stone has now been delivered to the new playground: Cllr Morgan would arrange for it to be laid. Cllr Martyn advised a survey of speeding vehicles would be published in the Corvedale News. Cllr R Povall said he would seek a resolution at the October meeting that the DPC meeting commencement time revert to 7.30pm

CULMINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES OF THE ORDINARY MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 1ST OCTOBER 2024

Present: Councillors Mr M Seabrook (Chair), Mr Ian Alderson, Mrs C Byng, Ms J Mear, Mr I Steele. In attendance: Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council) and H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Cllrs Andrew Pike, Mrs M Holland, Mr J Turley and Ms J Watts.

Declarations of Interest: None.

Public Involvement Session: No members of the public were present.

Minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 3rd September 2024 were approved and signed as correct.

Reports from Members: Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley reported that Shropshire Council was among a number of authorities that was experiencing financial difficulties. They had received nothing from the government on how it planned to deal with councils which were struggling. There was concern that the plans to build more houses might affect rural areas, particularly in areas where the infrastructure was already limited. Shropshire Council had responded to the new National Planning Policy Framework consultation. There had been a delay in the stickers for green bins being distributed: residents should continue to put green bins out as the refuse collectors know who has paid the fee. The new government wanted more devolution. Shropshire Council was in discussions with Herefordshire, Worcestershire, Warwickshire and Staffordshire. Cllr Motley reported that she would not stand at the next election. Councillors were very saddened to hear this news as Cllr Motley had been an excellent councillor, acting on behalf of the Corvedale over many years.

Village Hall Committee - Cllr Mear reported that the Bluebird Belles event had been very successful. The Tractor Run would be on 13th October, with proceeds going to the MS Society and Culmington Village Hall renovations. The Corvedale Choir would hold a Christmas concert at the hall. The Clerk reported that an application to change the entry on the Land Registry for the village hall had been made.

South Shropshire Area Committee - This would be deferred to the next meeting.

Planning: An appeal had been made against Shropshire Council's

refusal to grant permission for the erection of a detached dwelling and garage at land to the north of Seifton House, Seifton (Application reference: 23/04139/FUL). It was agreed to refer the inspector to the submission made to Shropshire Council on 27th October 2023 as the circumstances were unchanged.

Use of the Neighbourhood Fund to extend the speed limit to Clay Lane: The council had not received a response from the Place Plan team despite two emails. Cllr Motley suggested contacting Mr Newton, Traffic Engineer for Shropshire Council.

Shropshire Council's Local Council Survey: The council was willing to enter discussions with Shropshire Council but it did not have funding to support services presently funded by Shropshire Council. It supported the Environmental Maintenance Grant being fully reinstated next year and having greater freedom about how the grant could be used within the parish.

Blocked Bridleway: Shropshire Council Outdoor Partnership Team was exploring options as to how to clear the bridleway.

Waste Bin Collection: Cllr Motley was asked to investigate why there was a VAT charge.

Waste Bin near the Village Hall: Shropshire Council would be asked to move the public waste bin to the southern entrance to footpath 0524/39/1 near Culmington Village Hall.

Finance: Expenditure was within budget except for a slight overspend of £20.80 for insurance.

The Lloyds Bank account held £13,524.45 as at 23rd August 2024, which included the Environmental Maintenance, Parish Paths Grants and the Neighbourhood Fund. The bank reconciliation was agreed and signed as correct.

Replacement of the Neighbourhood Watch Sign in Culmington was included in the Draft Budget for 2025-2026.

Payments were authorised to: D Lewis (Environmental Maintenance) Inv 629 £135.00, H Coonick (Clerk, reimbursement for stationery, training) £21.43.

MUNSLOW PARISH COUNCIL

DRAFT MINUTES OF A MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY 2ND OCTOBER 2024

Present: Cllrs Barbara Archer (Chair), Richard Arnold, Nigel Dobson, Val Fotheringham, David Marston, Ed Povey, Richard Wilks and Graham Williams. In Attendance: H Coonick (Clerk/RFO).

Apologies for Absence: Cllr Chris Meeson, Cllr Cecilia Motley (Shropshire Council).

Declarations of Interest: None.

Public Forum: No members of the public were present.

Minutes of the meeting held on 4th September 2024 were approved, subject to an amendment of 10.3, which should read: 'Cllr Motley informed the meeting that it has not been decided whether there will be a booking system'.

New Councillors: Cllr Archer welcomed Cllr Richard Wilks. Both Cllrs Arnold and Wilks have completed and returned their Register of Interest forms and Cllr Wilks signed the Acceptance of Office Form.

Reports: Chairs Report - Cllr Archer reported that Lezley Picton (Leader of Shropshire Council) had reported that a booking system for all five recycling centres would start on 4th November 2024. They would remain open seven days a week until at least 31st March 2025.

Shropshire Council - Cllr Motley had sent a report. There had been a delay in getting enough stickers to put on green bins to show that the household was entitled to have the green bin emptied, but

residents could put their green bins out that week and they would be emptied. Once the stickers arrived, they should be put on the back of the bin (below the handle so they are easily visible to the bin men).

The Government wanted to move towards devolved local authorities with mayoralties introduced. This posed a problem for Shropshire as a large rural authority with a small population. Shropshire's Leader, Lezley Picton, had had a long conversation with the Leader of Telford & Wrekin Council. Nothing was ruled in or out but it was more likely that Telford would wish to join the West Midlands Combined Authority, which was not such an attractive proposition for Shropshire. Our Leader would, therefore, hold talks with Herefordshire, Warwickshire, Worcestershire and Staffordshire to see if there were enough synergies to make a combined authority look viable. The Police & Crime Commissioner, John Campion, was advocating a devolution deal based on the West Mercia authorities (which included Shropshire). No-one was sure how far this had developed yet. Shropshire Council had decided it needed to move from Shirehall to the Guildhall at Frankwell in Shrewsbury. The Shirehall currently is not fit for purpose. Since Covid many staff work part-time at home or in the market towns. The building had been originally designed to accommodate 4,500 people and now had nearer 200 working there regularly: it was becoming very uneconomic. Nevertheless, there has been considerable push-back, not least from the 'Save our Shirehall' group and the Shrewsbury Civic Society. However, the plan is to start vacating the building before Christmas and complete the move by February. Finally, last week, she had had a meeting with Derek Buchanan, Andy Wilde (AD in charge of Highways) Dan Morris (Cabinet Member for Highways) and Rob Macey (Cabinet Member for Leisure, Culture & Digital) to discuss the increasing demand for VAS signs and the rules that should apply to setting them up. There was an increasing demand for VAS signs but still confusion about who was responsible for what. The upshot of the meeting was that Derek Buchanan had been asked to come back with a set of rules for parishes to follow, acknowledging that there was an increasing demand for traffic calming measures and that most parishes were using some of their CIL Neighbourhood fund together with PC funding to obtain VAS signs and put them up themselves.

South Shropshire Area Committee - Cllr Archer reported on a meeting with the new MP, Stuart Anderson, and had raised with him the issue of speeding on the B4368. Mr Anderson had made a presentation to the committee stating that he had chosen to remain on the back benches so he could concentrate on constituency work. When comparing the rural with urban constituencies the rural areas were receiving much less government funding. There was a suggestion of moving the Ludlow Hospital to the Ecopark. He would like to see more building in Craven Arms. He was very concerned about the rate of rural crime in the County.

Survey from Shropshire Council re Future Options with Town and Parish Councils: The Parish Council's response would say that it had funded four vehicle activated signs and provided a defibrillator in the last two years. It would ask Shropshire Council to reinstate the full Environmental Maintenance Grant in 2025.

Place Plan Project Nomination Feedback: Cllrs Povey and Dobson would produce a Place Plan entry on Traffic Calming for consideration at the next meeting.

Highways: The two new Vehicle Activated Signs were now in use. Volunteers were needed to help with charging and moving the signs. Notices had been placed on the website and Facebook page asking for volunteers. There were issues with hedges overgrowing the signs: landowners would be asked to cut back the hedges.

The Environmental Maintenance Contractor would be asked to continue with general winter maintenance and clearance.

Application to the Police and Crime Commissioner 'My Community Fund': This was deferred to the next meeting.

Attendance at the War Memorial in Munslow on Remembrance Day and the Purchase of a Wreath: Cllr Archer would attend and lay a wreath on behalf of the Parish Council on 11th November.

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


